Peruvian mining families rise up against government corruption as the extractive industry fails to garner community

Boiling Point reached in fight for human rights and

environment. Throughout July, the Peruvian people rose up in a fury against the \$4.8 billion Conga mining project in Celendin, Cajamarca (Peru). From a *National Day to Combat Conga* (7/12) to the *International Day in Support of Cajamarca* (7/20), supporters in Peru and around the world rallied. This, <u>after five violent deaths</u> at the hands of the Peruvian government. Letters sent to President Humala underscored the violations of human rights and devastating effects of the mining. Now, the government has shut down all dialogue and criminalized any further protests against the mining. Read more. U.N. Women highlights discrimination against women that hampers development. According to the **2012 Social Institutions and Gender Index (SIGI)**, there is still much work to be done in many countries regarding social and legal discrimination against women. The results of the index, covering 121 countries, will call out the 86 countries that still have discriminatory inheritance practices or laws. Also, since 2009, progress is noted even within the most unequal regions. **Read the press release here**.
