The U.S. at the Tipping Point: Gun Violence and Mental

Illness: The Sandy Hook Elementary School massacre (12/14/12), perpetrated by a mentally ill gunman in Newtown, Connecticut, left 28 dead, including 20 innocent children and 6 teachers. In the aftermath, the Obama Administration has assigned a task force led by the Vice-President to review and recommend reforms within one month. It will specifically focus on banning military-style assault weapons and high-capacity magazines, in conjunction with reforming mental health policy. *Can the nation's anguish catalyze a movement towards a "nonviolent culture?"* In this case, violent video games may have also played a role. <u>Click here. It's estimated that 70% of seized guns in Mexico can be traced back to the United States. 2013 *World Social Forum*-Tunisia needs a <u>real</u> strategy on Land Grabbing. After the 2011 World Social *Forum (WSF)* in Dakar, Senegal, all the letters, protests and denunciations did little to diminish "land grabbing" around the world. At the upcoming 2013 WSF in Tunis in March, participants should prepare for success this time, rather than ending up with the "same-old, same-old" results. This will require better strategizing based on the decisions from the 2006 International Conference on Agrarian Reform and Rural Development (CIRADR) that included: (1) the securing of the property rights of the users/occupants; (2) re-launching of the processes of agrarian reforms based on a fair access to natural resources and rural development, and (3) the strengthening of the FAO's directives.

• Prevent the "Cessation of Refugee Status for Rwandans Fearing Return." Pressure the Office of the U.N. High Commissioner for Refugees (UNHCR) to reconsider its recommendation that the states invoke the Cessation Clause for Rwandan Refugees who fled between 1959 and 1998. Such action would put many at risk at a time when the fundamental, durable and positive changes required to invoke the Cessation Clause have not yet been achieved.
