◆ In the News. On January 2, according to *Fides Agency News*, **Franco Laudani**, **mccj** was arrested and beaten in Watsa territory, Wamba diocese in the Oriental Province (DR-Congo) by soldiers of the Congolese army (FARDC). The reason? he was protecting the pygmies who were unjustly arrested, and then later, with other civil authorities, was accused of "buying and selling elephant and okapi meat." Fr. Franco's passport was taken away. The incident is another example of the regional instability where the presence of M23 and other rebel groups makes life difficult. <u>Click here</u>.
